<u>Knowing the difference between a watch and a warning</u>

In the event severe weather breaks in your area, you should know the difference between a watch and a warning. Knowing the difference can help you to take the necessary actions when severe weather threatens.

Watches and Warnings are issued in two different entities.

A Watch means there is potential for hazardous weather. During a Watch, one should have a plan of action and pay close attention to weather updates. A Watch usually includes a larger area than a warning such as:

Flood Watch Severe Thunderstorm Tornado Watch

A Warning means the weather event is imminent or occurring, and weather could pose a threat to life and/or property. One should take action immediately when a warning is issued. Warnings are issued for a distinct area that is threatened such as:

Flood Warning Severe Thunderstorm Warning Tornado Warning
